Contextualization Notes

This piece was written for the University of Wisconsin Green Bay's December concert alongside other student composers. The real interest of the piece came from experimentation of what could be done with the univerity's string, wind, and percussion ensembles. Many parts were written with particular players in mind, and matching what the ensembles strengths were with interesting symphonic concepts. The name of the piece came from the idea of 'the man in the moon' being an artificially conceived face in the sky that is always present to those who look up to see it. The silliness of the name partly comes from the distaste and difficulty of naming pieces; naming a piece often tells the listener what to listen for and gives an immediate meaning to a piece. A funny way to challenge that, in an effort to displace any immediate assigning of meaning to a piece, is an absurd and abstracted title, so that listeners are left searching endlessly through the piece to find the meaning of that abstracted title. That way, the piece is able to do what it can without too much guidance from a name.
